## Explanatory Notes

### Scope

1. This publication presents sentencing statistics regarding the number, type and length of sentences handed down in the criminal jurisdiction of the Supreme and County Courts of Victoria.
2. Sentences shown in this report are as handed down in the first instance. Sentences from the Court of Appeal are not included.
3. Sentences handed down in the County Court as the result of an appeal against a Magistrate's decision in the Magistrates' Court or the Children's Court are not included.
4. Sentences imposed by the courts are necessarily dependent on the particular facts and circumstances of each case and defendant. This report does not, and cannot, include details of the matters taken into account by a court in determining the sentence to be imposed in any individual case.
5. While this report is derived from actual sentencing data, readers are cautioned against drawing conclusions as to trends in sentencing based solely on the material in this report.
6. This report does not distinguish between sentences handed down with a conviction and those handed down without a conviction.
7. The data includes summary matters heard in the County Court as provided by section 359AA of the *Crimes Act 1958*.
8. Matters disposed of by way of a *Nolle Prosequi* or where the defendant was acquitted, are not included, nor are orders relating to licences, compensation, restitution, forfeiture or forensic procedures.

### Reference Period

9. This publication presents data for those sentences handed down in the Supreme and County Courts of Victoria for the period 2001/02 to 2005/06.
10. The financial year relates to the date when the original order was given. A breach may not occur in the financial year in which the sentence was imposed. In some instances, the orders are still active, and therefore may be the subject of breach proceedings after the production of this publication.

## Explanatory Notes, continued

### Data Source

11. Data presented in this publication has been compiled from manually prepared Return of Prisoners Convicted forms (conviction returns) received by Court Services from both the Supreme and County Courts of Victoria. These conviction returns were then crosschecked against daily Court lists and the disposals report from the Court Listing Management System (CLMS), to ensure that all available data was captured. The accuracy of the data compiled for analysis is dependent upon the accurate endorsement of convictions returns, and the accurate entry of data into the Higher Courts Sentencing Database.
12. Data on committal hearings is from Courtlink and is sourced from the Magistrates' Court. 'Finalised in the committal stream' refers to defendants who were committed to a Higher Court (even if related summary charges were adjourned *sine die*) or dealt with summarily in the Magistrates' Court where the hearing booking in the Magistrates' Court was *committal mention*, *committal hearing* or *status / filing hearing*.

### Missing Data

13. Not all returns were forwarded to Court Services and, although an exhaustive search took place, Court Services has not been able to locate all conviction returns. Therefore, not all defendants will be included in this report.
14. Enquiries were made of the Office of Public Prosecutions, Commonwealth Director of Public Prosecutions and Victoria Police - Data Quality, who provided data for a number of missing returns. The Office of the Correctional Services Commissioner assisted in providing data missing from the conviction returns.
15. The estimate of missing data is as follows:

## Explanatory Notes, continued

### Previous Reports

16. The data contained in this report may differ from data contained in other reports available to the public because unique counting rules are employed by different agencies.
17. The statistics in this report follow on from the Victorian Higher Courts Sentencing Statistics 1997/98 – 2001/02 and 2002/03 which have previously been prepared by Court Services, Department of Justice. Due to the dynamic nature of the Higher Courts Sentencing Database, some variations between this report and the previous reports are evident. These variations are as a result of changed data entry practices, changes to counting rules and extensive data cleansing in 2005/06.
18. The Sentencing Advisory Council (SAC) has released sentencing statistics based on specific offences as well as on sentencing trends. There may be some variations between the figures reported in this report and the Sentencing Advisory Council figures. These variations are as a result of changed data entry practices, changes to counting rules and extensive data cleansing in 2005/06.

### Defendants

19. A defendant who has one or more charges before the same court at the same time is counted once, at the time of finalisation, in the Supreme or County Court.

### Principal Proven Offence

20. The principal proven offence is the offence that attracted the most severe penalty for the defendant. There is one principal proven offence per defendant.
21. In instances where the defendant has two different offences in the same offence category, for example, indecent assault of a child aged under 16 and indecent assault of a girl aged under 16, and these offences that have received the same sentence, the selection of the Principal Proven Offence is the subjective choice of the person entering the data in to the Higher Courts Sentencing Database.

### Age and sex of Defendant

22. The age of the defendant is calculated on the day the sentence was handed down in the Supreme or County Court.
23. Age and sex data is not counted where the defendant is a company. In 2001/02 two companies were not included, in 2002/03 six companies were not included, in 2003/04 ten companies were not included, in 2004/05 thirteen companies were not included, and in 2005/06 twelve companies were not included.

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## Explanatory Notes, continued

### Outcome of finalised charges

24. A charge (and a case) may attract more than one type of outcome or sentence, for example, a fine and a wholly suspended sentence. In such cases, the principal outcome will be the sentencing outcome that is highest in the sentencing hierarchy under the *Sentencing Act 1991*. For example, if a charge or case resulted in a fine and a wholly suspended sentence, the wholly suspended sentence would be recorded as the principal outcome.
25. For the purpose of this report, only one outcome (the principal outcome) has been recorded in relation to each case that was finalised. Where imprisonment was imposed the total effective sentence may be provided and this is marked accordingly.

### Offence Categories

26. The offence descriptions used in this report have been taken from conviction returns manually prepared by Judge's Associates and Court Registrars.
27. The offences have been divided into four offence groups and 21 offence categories. The definitions of these offence groups and categories are broadly consistent with those used in the Victoria Police Crime Statistics Report. The offence classifications and definitions used in this report are provided in Appendix B. This Appendix also includes a list of all offences found proven under these categories.

### Sentence types

28. 'Imprisonment' includes Imprisonment, Combined Custody and Treatment Order, Indefinite Term and Home Detention.
29. 'Suspended Sentence' includes Wholly Suspended Sentence and Partially Suspended Sentences and Wholly and Partially Suspended Sentences with a Recognisance Release Order (CWLTH).
30. 'Youth Training Centre' includes Youth Training Centre and Youth Residential Centre.
31. 'YSO/YAO' includes Youth Supervision Order and Youth Attendance Order.
32. 'Fine' includes an Aggregate fine.
33. 'Adjourned Undertaking' includes with and without conviction and Probation.
34. 'Discharge/Dismissal' includes Convicted and Discharged, Unconditional Dismissal and Unconditional Discharge.
35. 'CWLTH bonds' include Discharge/Dismiss with/without Recognisance Release Order and a Recognisance Release Order.

## Explanatory Notes, continued

### Sentence types, continued

36. 'Other orders' includes, Custodial Supervision Order, Non-Custodial Supervision Order, Hospital Order, Hospital Security Order, Hospital Order (CWLTH) and Unconditional Release.
37. Average terms of imprisonment do not include life sentences or indefinite sentences.
38. The total effective sentence operational period will be the same as the principal proven offence operational period as it is fixed once when the sentence is handed down.

### Sentence Hierarchy

39. The sentence hierarchy used to determine the principal proven offence is based on part 3 and 5 of the *Sentencing Act 1991*.
40. The only deviation from the Sentencing Act 1991 is where a defendant receives a sentence of imprisonment and a partially suspended sentence. In these instances the sentence which requires the defendant to serve the most time 'in custody' will be deemed the principal proven offence.
41. Where a sentence of imprisonment is deemed the principal proven offence over a partially suspended sentence, the total effective sentence may not be imprisonment but a partially suspended sentence. Throughout the publication some tables relate to the imprisonment lengths for the principal proven offence, and some to the imprisonment lengths for the total effective sentence. These numbers may not be the same due to this unique counting rule.

### Jurisdiction

42. The Supreme Court of Victoria is the State's superior court, and may hear all criminal matters unless specifically excluded by statute. Offences that may be heard include treason, murder and attempted murder.
43. The County Court of Victoria has jurisdiction to hear all indictable offences (that is, serious offences such as rape or armed robbery) other than treason, murder and some murder related offences.
44. In both the Supreme and County Courts, a judge and jury hear criminal trials.

## Glossary

<b>Acquittal</b>	A verdict of not guilty.
<b>Adjourned undertaking</b>	Sentencing order of the court where the charges are adjourned, with or without conviction, for a period of up to 60 months on the condition that the defendant will be of good behaviour during the period of the adjournment, and will observe any other condition of the undertaking.
<b>Average</b>	The sum of all sentence lengths imposed (excluding Life imprisonment and indefinite sentences), divided by the number of defendants who received the sentence lengths.
<b>Breach</b>	When the defendant does not observe the terms of a sentencing order, they may be brought back before the court to be re-sentenced for failing to comply with the conditions of the order.
<b>Case</b>	A set of charges before the court, which are to be dealt with at the same time.
<b>Charge</b>	An offence alleged to have been committed by the defendant.
<b>Combined custody and treatment order</b>	Sentencing order of the court of a term of imprisonment of up to 12 months, of which not less than 6 months is to be served in custody. The balance of the order is to be served in the community.
<b>Committal hearing</b>	A preliminary hearing before a Magistrate to determine if there is sufficient evidence to believe that a properly instructed jury would find the defendant guilty.
<b>Community based order</b>	Sentencing order of the court of up to 24 months with conditions attached requiring the defendant to perform unpaid work in the community and to attend programs specific to the defendant's needs, such as educational or anger management courses.
<b>Concurrent</b>	At the same time.
<b>Cumulative</b>	In addition to, or on top of.
<b>Custodial supervision order</b>	An order under the <i>Crimes (Mental Impairment &amp; Unfitness to be Tried) Act 1997</i> committing the defendant to custody in an appropriate place or in a prison under supervision for an indefinite term.
<b>Defendant</b>	A person or company against whom one or more charges have been laid.
<b>Discharge/dismiss with/without recognisance release order</b>	Sentencing order of the court applicable to offences against the Commonwealth that dismisses the charges or discharges the defendant without proceeding to a conviction, upon the defendant giving security, with or without sureties, by recognisance or otherwise, to be of good behaviour for up to 3 years.
<b>Fine</b>	Sentence order of the court of an amount of money to be paid as a penalty.

## Glossary, continued

<b>Found Guilty</b>	Includes defendants who have entered a plea of guilty and those who have been found guilty by a jury.
<b>Hospital order</b>	Sentence order of the court where a person who has been found guilty and appears to be mentally ill and requiring treatment, is, after the consideration of appropriate reports, admitted and detained in an approved mental health service as an involuntary patient.
<b>Hospital security order</b>	Sentence order of the court where a person who has been found guilty and appears to be mentally ill and requiring treatment, is, after the consideration of appropriate reports, admitted and detained in an approved mental health service as a security patient for a specified period of time.
<b>Imprisonment</b>	Sentencing order of the court committing the person into custody at a prison for a specified period of time.
<b>Indefinite sentence</b>	Sentencing order of a term of imprisonment imposed for an indefinite period of time. A nominal sentence is fixed, after which time the sentence must be reviewed.
<b>Indictable offence</b>	A serious criminal offence such as rape, armed robbery or murder, which generally require hearing in a Higher Court.
<b>Indictment</b>	A set of charges (counts) filed in the Supreme or County Court by the Commonwealth Director of Public Prosecutions to be determined in that court.
<b>Intensive corrections order</b>	Sentencing order of the court where a term of imprisonment of up to 12 months is imposed and ordered to be served in the community. This order type has strict conditions requiring the regular attendance of the defendant for community work and for prescribed programs.
<b>Maximum</b>	The highest sentence length imposed by a judge.
<b>Minimum</b>	The lowest sentence length imposed by a judge.
<b>Nolle prosequi</b>	Notice by the prosecution filed with the court advising that the charges will not be pursued any further.
<b>Non-custodial supervision order</b>	An order under the <i>Crimes (Mental Impairment &amp; Unfitness to be Tried) Act 1997</i> conditionally releasing the defendant on conditions as determined appropriate by the court.
<b>Non-parole period</b>	The length of time that the offender must serve in prison before becoming eligible to be released on parole.
<b>Operational period</b>	In relation to a suspended term of imprisonment, it means the period for which the defendant must not commit another offence punishable by imprisonment.

## Glossary, continued

<b>Partially suspended sentence</b>	Sentencing order of the court imposing a term of imprisonment, requiring part of that term of imprisonment to be served immediately, with the balance of that term to be suspended for a period of time ( <i>operational period</i> ) during which the defendant must not commit another offence punishable by imprisonment.
<b>Partially suspended sentence with recognisance release order</b>	Sentencing order of the court applicable to offences against the Commonwealth, that convicts the defendant and sentences them to a term of imprisonment, but directs that they be released either forthwith, or after having served a specified period of imprisonment, upon the defendant giving security, with or without sureties, by recognisance or otherwise, to be of good behaviour for up to 5 years.
<b>Percentage</b>	The percentage in this report may not total 100% due to rounding issues.
<b>Presentment</b>	A set of charges (counts) filed in the Supreme or County Court by the Office of Public Prosecutions to be determined in that court.
<b>Principal proven offence</b>	The offence that attracted the most severe penalty.
<b>Recognisance</b>	A sum of money to be paid by the defendant if they fail to comply with the conditions of their bond.
<b>Recognisance release order</b>	Sentencing order of the court applicable to offences against the Commonwealth, that convicts the defendant and releases them without passing sentence upon the defendant giving security, with or without sureties, by recognisance or otherwise, to be of good behaviour for up to 5 years.
<b>Summary offence</b>	A criminal offence that is regarded as being less serious than an indictable offence, for example road traffic offences, minor assaults, or offensive behaviour.
<b>Total effective sentence</b>	<p>The total effective sentence of the case, having taken into consideration the directions given by the Judge at the time of sentencing in regards to each of the charges.</p> <p>The following is an example of how this is applied in practice:</p> <p><i>On count 1 sentenced to 12 months imprisonment.</i></p> <p><i>On count 2 sentenced to 3 months imprisonment.</i></p> <p><i>On count 3 sentenced to 3 months imprisonment.</i></p> <p><i>Direct that count 3 be to be served concurrently (at the same time) with the sentence on count 2. Count 2 is to be served cumulatively (in addition to, or on top of) count 1, for a total effective sentence of 15 months.</i></p>

## Glossary, continued

<b>Unconditional Discharge</b>	Sentencing order of the court convicting the defendant and releasing them without any further order or conditions.
<b>Unconditional dismissal</b>	Sentencing order of the court where the defendant is found guilty of an offence, and released unconditionally without a conviction having been recorded.
<b>Wholly suspended sentence</b>	Sentencing order of the court imposing a term of imprisonment that is to be suspended for a period of time ( <i>operational period</i> ) during which the defendant must not commit another offence punishable by imprisonment.
<b>Wholly suspended sentence with recognisance release order</b>	Sentencing order of the court applicable to offences against the Commonwealth, that convicts the defendant and sentences them to a term of imprisonment, but directs that they be released either forthwith, or after having served a specified period of imprisonment, upon the defendant giving security, with or without sureties, by recognisance or otherwise, to be of good behaviour for up to 5 years.
<b>Young Person</b>	A defendant who at the time of being sentenced is under the age of 21 years.
<b>Youth training centre order</b>	Sentencing order of imprisonment imposed on a young person, which is to be served by way of detention in a youth training centre rather than a prison.
<b>90<sup>th</sup> Percentile</b>	The point, in an array of values, at which 10% of the values are above that point, and 90% of the values are below that point.

## Appendix B

### Offence categories

## Offence Categories

This report uses an offence classification based on the crime group classification used by the Victoria Police. The Victoria Police classification has four groups and 27 categories. The information provided on conviction returns does not allow all 27 crime groups to be distinguished, and this report uses a classification with 21 categories. This section outlines a description of the offence categories followed by a list of offences found proven under each category in Chapter 2 to 6.

### *Group 1: Offences against the Person*

#### **1. Homicide**

The unlawful killing, or attempted killing or conspiracy to kill someone. This category includes murder, attempted murder, manslaughter and culpable driving.

#### **2. Rape**

Sexual assaults that involve the sexual penetration (either actual or attempted) of the victim. This category includes rape, buggery with a person under 14 and buggery.

#### **3. Sex (Non-Rape)**

All sexual offences that do not amount to rape. They include Indecent assault, wilful and obscene exposure in public, indecent act with a child aged under 16, sexual penetration of a child aged 10 to 16, Incest, carnal knowledge and gross indecency.

#### **4. Robbery**

Involves the deprivation of property from a victim by the use or threatened use of force or any other coercive measure. This category includes armed robbery, robbery and assault with intent to rob. Crimes involving an unlawful demand for money or other property by the threat to use a coercive measure at some future time are classified as blackmail and extortion offences and are counted in the 'Other' crime category.

#### **5. Assault**

Crimes involving the direct infliction (or threatened infliction) of force, injury or violence on a person. This category includes unlawful assault, intentionally cause injury, recklessly cause injury, assault police, assault with weapon/instrument and make threat to kill.

## Offence Categories, continued

### 6. Abduction/kidnapping

Involve the unlawful taking away of another person against that person's will, or against the will of any person having lawful custody of the person abducted. This category includes false imprisonment, abduction for the act of sexual penetration, kidnap and unlawful and injurious imprisonment.

### *Group 2: Offences Against Property*

### 7. Arson

The wilful destruction or damage of property by fire or explosion. This category includes criminal damage by fire (Arson), criminal damage by fire (intentionally damage/destroy), and inciting to destroy property by fire.

### 8. Property Damage

The destruction, damage or defacing of any property by a means other than fire or explosion. This category includes criminal damage, wilful damage/injure property and possess article for criminal damage.

### 9. Burglary

Involves the illegal entry of a premises with the intention to commit an offence. This category includes burglary, enter building to commit offence/assault. The police classification distinguished between residential burglary, non-residential burglary and aggravated burglary.

### 10. Deception

The use of deception, secret agreements or false instruments with the intention of dishonestly obtaining property, services or other advantage. This category includes obtain property by deception, obtain financial advantage by deception and make false document offences (these are the most commonly recorded).

## Offence Categories, continued

### 11. Handle Stolen Goods

Includes offences arising from receiving, handling or processing money or goods that have been obtained illegally. Includes handle/receive/retain stolen goods, unlawful possession and possess property being proceeds of criminal offences (these are the most commonly recorded).

### 12. Theft

The taking of another person's property illegally with the intention of depriving that person of its use. The police crime classification distinguishes between theft of a motor vehicle, theft from a motor vehicle, shop stealing and other theft.

#### *Group 3: Drug Offences*

### 13. Cultivate, Manufacture, Traffick Drugs

The cultivation, manufacture, sale or supply of commercial quantities of illicit drugs or other controlled substances. This category includes cultivate a narcotic plant and traffick in a drug of dependence.

### 14. Possess, Use

The possession or a non-commercial quantity of illicit drugs or the use of illicit drugs. Includes possess a drug of dependence and use a drug of dependence.

#### *Group 4: Other Offences*

### 15. Justice Procedures

The offences included in this category are generally acts or omissions that interfere with the effective operation of the justice system, or contravene orders made by courts or other officials. Includes breach of intervention order, resist police, resist arrest and fail to answer bail.

### 16. Regulated Public Orders

Offences involve conduct that is regulated or prohibited on moral or ethical grounds. Includes loiter for prostitution, minor possess liquor and minor consume liquor.

## Offence Categories, continued

### 17. Weapons/Explosives

Offences relating to the possession, storage or use of weapons or explosives, including both regulated and prohibited weapons. Offences within this category include possess a regulated weapon, possess/carry/use unlicensed gun, possess a dangerous article and prohibited person possess a firearm.

### 18. Harassment

Actions that harass or are intended to harass, threaten or invade the privacy of an individual. Offences within this category include use phone services to menace/harass/offend, stalk another person, use telecommunications service to menace/harass and knowingly interfere with facility.

### 19. Traffic

Offences associated with the licencing of drivers or the registration or use of motor vehicles. This is not an offence category within the police classification.

### 20. Behaviour in Public

Offences involving personal conduct that involves or may lead to a breach of public order. Offences include behave in an offensive manner in a public place, use indecent language in a public place, drunk in a public place and loiter with the intent to commit an indictable offence.

### 21. Other

This is a category made up of all offences that do not fall into any other category. Includes unlawfully on premises, tamper with motor vehicle, licensed motor car trader fail to make entries in dealings book, interfere with motor vehicle, beg alms, bomb hoax, import prohibited import and travel without a valid ticket (these are among the most common offences).
